Economic Background	Corsicana is where oil was first produced west of the Mississippi, which established the town as an historic industrial and commercial center. The area has the longest continuous oil flow in Texas, with a total production in excess of 200 million barrels since 1895. Other minerals produced in the area include natural gas, sand, and gravel. Corsicana is fortunate to possess a diverse portfolio of industries including manufacturing and fabrication, chemical engineering, distribution/logistics, transportation, 2 railroads, oil and gas, and agriculture/cattle.
